FBN/Law and Ethics at the End of Life

Program Objective This conference will explore the legal and ethical issues inherent in end of life healthcare in hospitals, hospices, nursing homes and in the outpatient setting. Recent legislative changes in Florida's End of Life statutes will also be explored. Presentations will include information about changes that must be made in Advance Directive forms, requirements for implementation of a patient's advance directive, and problems arising when patients and families demand medical care. This conference is for professionals serving on ethics committees, Nurses, Risk Managers, Physicians, Hospital, Hospice and Nursing Home Attorneys, Elder Law Attorneys, Chaplains, Social Workers, and other healthcare professionals.
